

COLLINS, Alan

Born: c. 1923, Ilford, Essex, England.

Alan made occasional appearances in Division Three for Tamworth after the war but was never able to secure a regular team place at the Midlands track. He later worked in the U.S. Embassy in Amsterdam and rode in the Dutch league for the Rotterdam based side Feyenoord for a number of years. His main claim to fame was to be the owner of a famous bike which was nicknamed 'The Killer' by its first owner, Ron Johnson, and was later ridden by Colin Watson in the race that ended his career at Bradford in 1946.
